Action Plan for the use of Funding to Develop PE and School Sport at Hollinhey Primary School 2021-22

The government is again providing additional funding for the 2021/2022 academic year. It is to be used to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding – provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport – and is allocated to primary school head teachers. The funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools. This year Hollinhey have been allocated £17,700 and have carried over £12,990 from 2020/21, totalling £30,690

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they have had the freedom to choose how they do this.

Possible uses for the funding might include:

- Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers when teaching PE
- Paying for professional development opportunities for teachers in PE and sport
- Providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE and sport
- Running sport competitions, or increasing pupils' participation in the School Games
- Buying resources that will enhance PE provision at Hollinhey
- Developing more active PE provision at lunchtimes

Sports Funding at Hollinhey

Vision: ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

Objective: To achieve **self-sustaining** improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools against 6 key indicators:

- 1. the engagement of <u>all</u> pupils in regular physical activity kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
- 2. the profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
- 3. increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. increased participation in competitive sport
- 6. all Year 6 pupils to be able to swim competently, confidently and proficiently over 25 metres.

Staff at Hollinhey are passionate about sport and the benefits **sport can promote including; fun, a healthy lifestyle, teamwork and sportsmanship**. A concerted effort has been made with the help of the funding, through resources and provision to widen sporting opportunities across the school to include as many children as possible, regardless of age, gender and ability.
