## Action Plan for the use of Funding to Develop PE and School Sport at Hollinhey Primary School 2024-25

The government is providing additional funding for the 2023/2024 academic year. It is to be used to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding – provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport – and is allocated to primary school head teachers. The funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools. This year Hollinhey have been allocated £17,950.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

- 1. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 2. Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity
- 3. The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and physical activities offered to all pupils
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport

Our Vision: ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

Staff at Hollinhey are passionate about sport and the benefits **sport can promote including; fun, a healthy lifestyle, teamwork and sportsmanship**. A concerted effort has been made with the help of the funding, through resources and provision to widen sporting opportunities across the school to include as many children as possible, regardless of age, gender and ability.
